

Paradox of Tolerance: Lesson Plan

Topic	
<p>The paradox of tolerance is summarized by the seemingly counterintuitive idea that “in order to maintain a tolerant society, the society must be intolerant of intolerance.” Essentially, if a so-called tolerant society permits the existence of intolerant philosophies, it is no longer tolerant.</p>

Activity Ideas

- Read the [First Amendment to the US Constitution](#). Write a clause that addresses intolerant speech and how it affects (or does not affect) Constitutional rights under the First Amendment. Defend your added clause in a paragraph or two.
- Split the class into two groups for a debate. One side argues that we must tolerate intolerance because of freedom of speech. The other side argues that the government should impose restrictions on intolerant speech.
